

BOND PROGRAM AND MAJOR PROJECTS

As stewards of citizens' investment in our park system, Dallas Park and Recreation moved forward with designing, improving, and building recreational facilities, parks, and other leisure amenities with voter-approved bond revenues. Capital improvements in our park system are underway, thanks to the 2017 bond program that provided \$312 million for parks, trails and facility improvements, and new construction. Generous supporters and partners also pledged \$159 million in match funding.



Dallas County and city of Dallas officials joined residents in the opening of the newest section of the Northaven Trail between Preston Road and Midway Road. With the introduction of this section, the Northaven Trail is now complete from just west of US 75 to the Walnut Hill-Denton DART Station in Northwest Dallas. In partnership with Dallas County, North Central Texas Council of Government and Texas Department of Transportation, construction will begin in 2021 to extend the Northaven Trail across US 75 with a new bridge connecting to Cottonwood Creek and White Rock Creek trails.

- Construction of new aquatic centers at Harry Stone and Exline parks
- Installation of sand volleyball court at Lake Highlands North Park
- Construction contract for Bachman Recreation Center
- Historic restoration of Hall of State at Fair Park Restoration
- Renovations of Fair Park facilities that include the Music Hall, African-American Museum, Coliseum, and the Children's Aquarium Annex

Hamilton Park residents joined with city officials to break ground for a new wing at Willie B. Johnson Recreation Center. The expansion will include a new gymnasium and a specially designed area for seniors.





A virtual groundbreaking kicked off construction of West End Square Park. The new park will replace a surface parking lot and will feature an outdoor workroom, prairie gardens, porch swings, game tables and a water feature. Expected to open spring 2021, West End Square promises visitors a lush oasis in the West End Historic District, a thriving residential, entertainment and retail area.

FY 19/20 GENERAL FUND EXPENSE BUDGET BY CATEGORY \$89,957,498



FY 19/20 ACTUAL EXPENSES

RECREATION SERVICES

With innovation, originality, and technology, Dallas Park and Recreation adapted traditional leisure activities and put them online. We continued to deliver essential services to communities to help them cope with the new lifestyle normal.

Here's a recap of how our Recreation Services and Visitor Experience and Community Engagement divisions addressed ongoing social, economic, and health challenges and made summer 2020 a virtual reality for Dallas families!



WE SUPPORTED THE WELL-BEING OF COMMUNITIES IN BRAND NEW WAYS

TWENTY-FIVE EMPLOYEES CUT, PINNED, SEWED, PRESSED AND ASSEMBLED 5,000 MASKS with fabrics/materials donated by the American Sewing Guild, local fabric and craft stores, and caring individuals. Heat-pressed vinyl decals of the park department logo personalized the masks. Residents picked up masks - personalized with the department's logo - at drive-thru distribution stations at 40 recreation centers. The Senior Program Division outfitted an additional 1,000 seniors with masks.



WE CREATED A SUMMER OF VIRTUAL FUN

Rec@Home videos offered 24-hour fun-on-demand activities. In-house production of more than 40 videos provided step-by-step demos for fitness, family games, arts, crafts, healthy snacks, and special interest topics. New videos are posted weekly on DallasParks.org and social media. Videos designed for seniors included bingo, sit and fit, name that tune, random topics, and motivation Monday. Forty-eight individuals with disabilities used Facebook to enjoy 12 weeks of daily online recreation with **Bachman Recreation Center**. Therapeutic recreation staff devoted 120 hours to create content, record, edit, and star in activity videos that highlighted fitness, music, reading, trivia, art, American Sign Language, and more.



Free **Rec@Home** virtual camps kept kids of all ages busy crafting, creating, cooking and more! For five weeks, energetic camp leaders inspired 150 youth in fun-friendly arts, crafts, sports, cooking, science, trivia and recreational activities.

We supported outreach efforts of other organizations and agencies when 60 employees telephoned 2,000 residents for the 2020 Census while other staff assisted each week with packing and loading items at the Harmony Food Pantry in Oak Cliff.

Thirty-three recreation centers provided **Grab 'n Go** meals for youth up to 18, serving more than 50 breakfast/lunch combos on weekdays for two months. The **Senior Program Division** joined Dallas County Nutrition to provide hot meals to 415 senior adults at four recreation centers. **Popsicles in the Park** popped up at neighborhood parks to serve frozen treats to more than 500 senior adults. The drive-thru event featured music and entertainment by the Office of Arts and Culture. Nine recreation centers distributed 1,000 free **DIY Rec@Home kits** containing supplies for arts and crafts supplies, games for family or individual play, craft ideas booklet and a science project using household items. DART provided transportation to help **Senior Program staff** deliver 800 care packages filled with snacks, sanitizer, water, coloring books and more to Dallas' most treasured residents.



Robotics and virtual reality technology camps stretched the imaginations of 97 young techies with free hands-on instruction from experts and educators. Robotics class campers each received an Ozobot robot -valued at \$99 - to aid them in learning basic coding. The virtual reality camp balanced an hour of live instruction with peer interaction. The weeklong camps gave campers 20 hours of useful project-based activities.

At the **Teen Tech Center**, Engineer for the Week (EFTW) demystified technology with project-based learning activities focused on current social issues. Future engineers created a page **CHATBOT** that offered COVID-19 info from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.



Before 35 recreation centers reopened, specially designed training gave employees a greater understanding of new safety protocols they needed to return to work. The virtual training outlined staff expectations at work, participant/visitors' expectations in park facilities, and best practices for staff and patron interactions. More than 400 employees attended one of five hour-long trainings offered in English and Spanish.



Recreation Services supported our Park Rangers as park monitors to remind park and trail users to practice social distancing. More than 300 employees worked 1,136 shifts and 5,308 hours to ensure visitors played by the (safety) rules. As playgrounds and park amenities reopened, *Play It Safe In Dallas Parks* awareness campaign kicked off with a **SAFETY VIDEO FROM THE PARK RANGERS**. The newly launched **TRAILBLAZERS** offered insights into city trails with blog posts written by novice and avid trail users who share their trail experiences with safety tips, photos, and videos.

During National Water Safety Month, the **Dallas Aquatics WATER SAFETY CHALLENGE** featured interactive videos in English and Spanish to guide viewers through a series of safety scenarios. The lessons had more than 16,000 views on social media as well as on Dallas Independent School District's At-Home Learning webpage for PK-6 teachers and students.

Water Safety Wednesdays presented by **DALLAS AQUATICS** offered tips for staying safe in and around pools, lakes and other bodies of water. The sessions - held twice daily for four weeks - averaged 25 participants.



We celebrated July as Park and Recreation Month with our in-house production of [We Are Parks and Recreation](#) to showcase Dallas' park and recreation professionals. In addition to the video, photos/profiles of 31 employees sharing sentiments about what it means to work in parks and recreation were featured every day in July on social media and [DallasParks.org](#)



GOLF & TENNIS

Dallas Park and Recreation provides residents with five full-service tennis centers with a total of 83 tennis courts located throughout Dallas. Each center is open daily and offers lighted courts, professional instruction, league and tournament play, retail and concession sales, and equipment and repair services. With the rising increase in Pickleball interest this year, some Tennis Centers have also become equipped with Pickleball lined courts and dedicated courts for play.

The City of Dallas provides six beautifully maintained golf courses for the citizens of Dallas. Each property offers a unique golfing experience for players ranging from beginner to professional. The citizens of Dallas have the ability to improve their games through professional instruction and the utilization of our driving ranges and practice facilities. Each course can host tournaments of all sizes and the pro shops are fully equipped to meet the customer's growing needs.

PARK MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS


The Park Maintenance and Operations Division Treecycling Program was created with the ultimate goal of diverting 100% of all park forestry by-products from the landfill to be used back in the parks as mulch or compost. To launch into Phase 1 of the program, the Department applied for a solid waste grant with the North Central Texas Council of Governments for \$200,000 to purchase a trommel screener. The grant was awarded and will be instrumental in separating bulk aggregates to bring mulch to park ornamental standards and serve as the composting catalyst for approximately 20% of generated materials.



Park Rangers played an essential role in ensuring the health and safety of our citizens this fiscal year during the COVID-19 pandemic. Following a brief shutdown of all park amenities, Rangers were charged with managing the daily safety measures and protocols implemented by the Department. Park Rangers strongly encouraged social distancing in parks and trails. This effort included Rangers patrolling and monitoring the parks, trails, and amenities with signage. Rangers were still able to enforce compliance with general park rules while making more than 18,000 park visits.



The Dallas Park and Recreation Department led the effort to get the City of Dallas designated as one of the first designees of Bird City, Texas. This is a joint recognition between Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Audubon Texas. A conservation plan including the execution of conservation practices in “Community Engagement,” “Habitat Enhancement and Protection,” and “Creating Safer Places for Birds” was enacted. A total of 26 activities had to be enacted to gain the certification of “Bird City Texas.” Working with a variety of stakeholders and partnering agencies, greater attention was brought to the importance of bird conservation in Dallas.



This past FY, we had approximately 5.7 million pedestrian and cyclist count on our trail counters. The Park Department has 35 counters across 17 parks or major trails. The counters were especially critical during the early months of the COVID-19 breakout to determine the need for a plan to reduce people on the trails to assist with social distancing. Another long-term use of the trail counter system is to provide critical information for trail expansion and routine maintenance scheduling.



COOL SCHOOLS

Dallas joined a nationwide campaign in 2017 that focused on increasing park access to promote livable communities. Spearheaded by The Trust for Public Land, the 10-Minute Walk Campaign developed an overarching goal of ensuring as many residents as possible have access to a park or open space within a 10-minute (0.5-mile) walk of their home.

Dallas Park and Recreation's strategy to accomplish this goal is the Cool School Community Parks. Through Cool School, the department partners with school districts to replace outdated playgrounds at select campuses in exchange for public access after hours and weekends. This team effort takes advantage of school playground facilities' proximity to neighborhoods that give residents access to their campus for recreation.

Expanding these partnerships to more neighborhood schools will let Dallas increase its current walkability and access rate of 69% to 78%.
