Every year, our park system returns \$678 million to the local economy. Dallas parks generate more than \$300 million in annual tourism value.

For every dollar we spend or invest for infrastructure, new parks, playgrounds and other recreational amenities, there is a 7:1 return on investment. 



Dallas Showcased Its Rich Culture As Hosts For Premiere Park Conference

Dallas hosted the largest gathering of park and recreation professionals for the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) 2023 Annual Conference. This incredible learning and networking experience attracted 8,349 professionals from across the country and celebrated Dallas' rich cultural diversity and its award-winning park system. Always a conference favorite, the interactive Exhibit Hall featured the latest park and recreation products and services from 500 vendors.



Dallas Park and Recreation Department's Marketing and Communications team designed the logo used for the t-shirts and marketing materials.

More than 250 conference attendees joined with community members to plant 150 trees at Dallas' Lake Cliff Park for the NRPA Day of Service.

Their volunteer efforts enhanced the Oak Cliff park and encouraged conservation and stewardship of public spaces.

Twenty-eight Dallas professionals shared their expertise as presenters and panelists in 16 educational sessions, delving into discussions on leadership, social media, community engagement, forestry, environmental best practices, and general park maintenance.



The NRPA Conference Golf Tournament took place at the historic Cedar Crest Golf Course – site of the 1927 PGA Championship – and challenged players with its greenside bunkers, rolling terrain, and tree-lined fairways.





Top College Golfers Brought ‘A’-Game Talent to Cedar Crest

Cedar Crest golf course – one of six Dallas 18-hole courses – hosted the Southwest Airlines Showcase that brought the nation’s top 42 African American collegiate golfers to Dallas to compete in separate-but-concurrent 54-hole stroke play contests. The Showcase was a new addition to Golf Channel live televised college golf tournaments. Golf Channel televised all three rounds live with evening replays.

Samuell Farm Selected as Leave No Trace Spotlight Recipient

The Leave No Trace national organization selected Dallas' 400-acre Samuell Farm in Mesquite as a 2023 Leave No Trace Spotlight, one of 20 sites nationwide chosen to host education and stewardship activities for communities to become familiar with Leave No Trace principles. The department's Outdoor Adventures team provided hands-on learning opportunities for youth, educators, and residents. The Leave No Trace Amazing Race attracted families who sprinted throughout the farm to navigate a specially designed Leave No Trace obstacle course for prizes. Combating Light Pollution

To reduce light pollution, Dallas Park and Recreation installed Dark Sky Lighting – lighting directed downwards – at parks, trails, and other facilities including the newly restored Japanese Garden at Kidd Springs Park. New LED lighting gives the garden, at night an inviting and peaceful atmosphere for all to enjoy.

Other areas with Dark Sky Lighting are the Stone Tables at White Rock Lake, Ridgewood and Reverchon parks, SOPAC Trail, and Campbell Green Park pickleball courts.

Being Green and Saving Energy with Solar Panels

Three recreation centers are powered in part by solar energy: Fretz, Pleasant Oaks, and Willie B. Johnson. Solar energy at Fretz and Pleasant Oaks offset overall facility energy usage with an anticipated average offset of 53% of the two facilities' annual energy usage. At Willie B. Johnson, the solar array provides enough power for the building's interior and exterior lighting.

Pickleball Court Expansion


Easy-to-learn for all ages and fitness levels, pickleball quickly grew in popularity. An increased demand for outdoor pickleball courts led to the expansion of converted multiuse courts and the construction of dedicated pickleball courts in city parks. The department collaborated with Pickleball USA to standardize the color scheme and design for the Dallas' 85 outdoor pickleball courts.



Teens Organized and Prepared for Success (TOPS)

Dallas Park and Recreation kept teens engaged with free, fun, and educational activities. Teens Organized and Prepared for Success (TOPS) featured year-round activities for ages 13 to 17 that encouraged career preparation while providing social opportunities to connect with others! Teen Late Night held monthly at 15 recreation centers engaged young people with performing arts, STEM, sports, music, esports, and pizza!

Dallas Stars Partnership Prepared Future Stars

The Dallas Stars created Future Stars and Dallas Park and Recreation was among the first in the metroplex to launch the Stars' sports development program at Dallas recreation centers. Boys and girls 7 to 12 learned basic puck-handling, passing, and shooting drills. The Stars provided clinics, coaches, training, equipment, and tickets to Stars games – all at no cost to participants. The Park Department's partnership with the Stars brought hockey to communities typically underrepresented in the sport and inspired future athletes and lifelong fans.



Mother's Day Luncheon Honored and Celebrated Senior Women

Dallas Park and Recreation celebrated the women whose unconditional love for family creates strong communities. More than 800 women who participated in the department's senior adult programs were guests of honor at the annual Mother's Day Luncheon. Held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Reunited – Stronger Together guests enjoyed musical entertainment, an informational vendor fair, and a keynote address by Jennifer Bartkowski, CEO of Girl Scouts of Northeast Texas. This was the first time guests were able to network and visit in person since 2019.





NCAA gifted an outdoor basketball court to Mattie Nash-Myrtle Davis Park in time for the 2023 NCAA Women's Final Four tipoff in Dallas. The NCAA Women's Final Four, Degree Deodorant, and the Dallas Local Organizing Committee built the colorful, ultra-trendy court at the west Dallas park. Each year the NCAA Men's and Women's Final Four donate a project to their Final Four host city to foster goodwill and sportsmanship.



Kidds Springs Japanese Garden Ribbon Cutting Ceremony

Consul General Hirofumi Murabayashi of Japan in Houston and Dr. Sam Shichijom, honorary consul of Japan in Dallas, were among guests when Dallas Park and Recreation celebrated the restoration and reopening of the Japanese Garden at Kidd Springs Park. The garden – designed in the late 1960s – features essential design elements found in traditional Japanese gardens: stone for the landscape; water to represent life; and plants for color and seasonal changes as well as ancient sculptures and Japanese treasures. City Acquired Natural Area for Future Recreational Development

Dallas City Council voted to accept the donation of a rustic 300-acre property in southwestern Dallas known as Big Cedar Wilderness. The area is home to hills, cliffs and pristine environments including more than 50,000 trees, meandering creeks, and tributaries. For decades, mountain bikers, hikers, birdwatchers, and community groups have used the privately-owned property for recreation. Although the area officially is not a public park, Dallas Park and Recreation will enhance existing amenities and increase public access to the natural area.

Reverchon Park Ballfield Groundbreaking


Forest-Audelia Multipurpose Center and Project Kickoff

Grand Opening of Harwood Park



Historic Statues Unveiled at Cedar Crest Legends Plaza

Statues honoring golf greats Walter Hagen - 1927 PGA Championship winner - and Charlie Sifford - 1954 UGA Negro National Open champion - were unveiled at the newly constructed Legends Plaza at Cedar Crest Golf Course. Among guests marking the historic occasion was Charles Sifford Jr., who shared insights about his father's career. The occasion was hosted by Dallas Park and Recreation, I Am a Golfer Foundation, and Cedar Crest Golf Course.



Ultramodern Renovations Transformed North Dallas Center

Willie B. Johnson Recreation Center reopened with a fresh modern interior and exterior. The \$8.8 million expansion project added an additional 22,000 square feet to the 38-year-old facility. The center features touch-free restrooms, 12,000 square-foot gymnasium, senior adult area, expanded parking, and paved walking trail.

Recreation Center Renamed to Honor Dallas Businessman

Cummings Recreation Center was renamed to honor Hiawatha Williams, a Dallas businessman and founder of Williams Chicken. Williams is known for his philanthropy as much as he is for his fried chicken restaurants. The 35th anniversary of his company coincided with the naming of the Hiawatha Williams Recreation Center, which is located blocks from where the first Williams Chicken opened.

Park Tank

Park Tank encouraged innovation among Dallas Park and Recreation professionals by giving them an opportunity to pitch projects in a Shark Tank-style competition. Twenty-five projects were submitted and 12 were presented as pitches to the department's executive leadership who served as the Park Tank "Sharks." The program provided employees with mentorship and coaching to develop and communicate their ideas professionally and recognized and rewarded employees for innovative thinking, initiative, and follow-through.

Diversity Video Earned TATO A Award

A video highlighting how families benefit from Dallas Park and Recreation's therapeutic recreation program earned honorable mention in the TATO A (Texas Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors) Government Programming Awards Diversity, Equity and Inclusion category. Dallas Seniors Enjoyed Free Recreation Thanks To WellMed

For the 4th time, WellMed Charitable Foundation (WCF) made free access to recreation programs possible for Dallas seniors when it donated \$150,000 to the City of Dallas. Dallas Park and Recreation used the gift to waive annual and monthly fees at city recreation centers for ages 60 and older. Since the first donation was announced in 2017, almost 30,000 adults have enrolled at a City of Dallas recreation center. WCF is the philanthropic partner of WellMed and USMD Health System.



White Rock Lake Foundation Earmarked Donation for Winfrey Point Restoration

The White Rock Lake Foundation (WRLF) presented \$151,250 to help Dallas Park and Recreation restore the historic event venue Winfrey Point at White Rock Lake. The donation will be used for air and heating repairs, interior painting, roofing, and other restoration initiatives. Restoring the building to its original glory is estimated to cost \$500,000. The foundation raised the monies from its annual golf tournament and Jewel of Dallas Gala that raised approximately \$78,000. The foundation was approved for a matching-fund program through the city that will bring the total amount earmarked for the restoration to more than \$300,000.

Dallas Park and Recreation's Branching Out reforestation program brings volunteers of all ages together to plant oaks, elms, and other tree species at Dallas parks. Through Branching Out, the department continued to work to increase Dallas' tree canopy to 37 percent by 2040. Branching Out welcomed hundreds of individuals, families, Friends groups, and corporate/business teams to planting events!
